SUBJECT: 2007 Annual Report

The following represents our annual report for the Small Business Development Center of Northland Pioneer College. This report is in the format required by the U.S. Small Business Administration for SBDC's, and uses their categories for reporting, which follow.

Economic Impact

Our SBDC worked closely with its clients, which in 2007 consisted of over 300 small businesses. The makeup of our client base was 51% white, 18% Native American, 57% Startups (not yet in business), 51% female, 3% disabled, and 5.9% veterans. We worked with clients throughout Navajo and Apache Counties and collected economic impact numbers as we worked with them providing direct assistance, and from a survey we did in the later part of the year. From this data, our clients achieved the following economic impact and/or growth:

New or retained jobs – 149 Loans obtained - \$3,782,000 Owners capital invested - \$1,372,000 Other capital investment - \$348,500 Increased revenues - \$5,503,500 Successful Startup Businesses - 23

0100 Advocacy

The Northland Pioneer College Small Business Development Center (NPC-SBDC) has taken an active role in advocacy this year by participating with many organizations, including local Chambers of Commerce, Economic Development Agencies, Industry Trade groups, Arizona State Service agencies, and local Tribal agencies. We nominated one of our long-time clients during 2007 as the U.S. Small Business Administrations Business Advocate of the Year.

0200 Capital Formation

NPC-SBDC assisted clients with \$5.5 million dollars in debt and equity financing in 2007. We strive to maintain relationships with our local banks, and work closely with our local SBA office to develop clients and help clients with capital acquisition.

0300 Innovation and Technology Transfer

NPC-SBDC primarily assists e-commerce type technology-based clients. NPC-SBDC maintains a computer lab on-site with the latest applications. NPC-SBDC assisted clients with procurement activities by providing hands-on assistance with CCR, Hub Zone, Arizona State Agencies and SBA websites routinely in client counseling sessions. NPC-SBDC continues to specialize in assistance to forestry entrepreneurs in technology transfer in the conversion of small diameter timber into usable products and new uses.

0400 International Trade

NPC-SBDC has limited clients who deal in international trade. Import/export clients are referred to the Arizona Department of Commerce – International Trade Department and to our sister center at Maricopa Community College.

0500 Minority Small Business Development

The NPC-SBDC territory is comprised of Apache and Navajo County. The population of Apache County is approximately 77% Native American and Navajo County is approximately 50%. NPC-SBDC continues to focus on Native American assistance by providing the Native American Enterprise program, a 2-year degree program offered through the college, and seminars and one-on-one counseling. NPC-SBDC currently has two Business Analysts that are Native American and we serve the three largest Native American reservations in the U.S., the Navajo, Apache and Hopi. During 2007 we completed two NxLevel Entrepreneurial classes in Whiteriver, cosponsored by the White Mountain Apache Housing Authority.

0600 Resource Development

We initiated a workgroup that is helping to develop workforce development plans for the region, specifically focused on the wood products industry. With over 400 jobs created in the last two years as a result of the largest Stewardship contract in the U.S., the industry needs new programs and assistance in managing employment, hiring and training needs. We successfully assisted the Eastern Counties Organization in writing and being awarded a USDA Forest Service grant for \$65,000 to assist in this area.

We applied for and received a Coleman Foundation Grant during 2007 for \$5,000 to promote and offer outreach for our Native American Enterprise Program. This program is to extend our efforts to local High School youth on all three reservations to increase entrepreneurial efforts for the region.

0700 Procurement

The NPC-SBDC serves as a reference site for SBA. We provide information on state contracting opportunities and procedures, and assist clients with 8(a) applications. We also assist clients with CCR certifications and Hub-Zone.

0800 Special Emphasis Groups

The NPC-SBDC has a special interest in working with the Northern Arizona Wood Products Association, a local trade association, to assist in the utilization and marketing of small diameter wood in our area. The NPC-SBDC serves on their Board of Directors and assists entrepreneurs interested in developing uses for the harvesting of small diameter trees. We have also sponsored meetings and participated in the Executive Committee of the Southwest Sustainable Forests Partnership, a consortium of local, state and federal agencies that are focused on restoring the forests to health and prevention of catastrophic wildfire in the region. Nearly one-half of our client growth in sales is due to efforts working with local businesses in utilizing the forestry resource locally.

0900 Economic Development, Faith Based and Community Initiatives

NPC-SBDC actively participates in the economic development efforts of our local Chambers of Commerce and Economic Development Authorities for Navajo and Apache Counties and the Apache, Navajo and Hopi tribes. An example is our assistance of Pinetop-Lakeside Mainstreet, a local non-profit, with retail development during the year. We jointly worked with Mainstreet, the City, and clients in assisting with project development.

1000 Research

NPC-SBDC continues to expand its reference library at the Show Low Campus. NPC-SBDC utilizes the Hillsource.Org research service and the SBDC.NET research center. NPC-SBDC analysts help clients find research on their industry and competition.

1100 Other Activity

1200 Success Stories

We have seen a tremendous success in the Forestry Stewardship Contract with the increase of jobs and economic progress. A study released in March 2007 by University of Arizona showed over 400 jobs created through this contract, and new expenditures regionally of over \$15 million per year. We have assisted onethird of the local firms involved in utilization and processing of material from the contract, and a good percentage of the equity capital and job growth reported for the center is from this focus area.

For 2007 our nomination to the Arizona SBDC Success Awards program was Barton Southwest Builders. A Navajo couple from Dilcon, AZ, Robert and Margie Barton utilized the services of Suzy Baldwin, SBDC Counselor from St. Michaels. Suzy helped the Bartons with their business plan, procuring a loan, and helped them start a successful contracting business. The Bartons have added 30 jobs to their business, all Navajo employees, and are looking to over \$2 million in sales during 2008 from various contracts on and off the reservation. They will be recognized February 13th in Phoenix by a statewide gathering of business and governmental leaders to be held at the Heard Museum.

1300 Travel

With over 21,000 square miles of territory we are probably the most widely traveled SBDC in the State of Arizona.

1600 Women-Owned Businesses

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Women comprised the majority of NPC-SBDC clientele for 2007, slightly higher than males. NPC-SBDC works with our local area SBA outreach specialist to provide information on the SBA Small Disadvantaged Business and 8(a) certifications to our community.

<u>1800 Veterans, Service Connected-Disabled Veteran-Owned Businesses,</u> <u>Reservists on Active Duty and Other Reserve Component Members of the U.S.</u> <u>Military</u>

5.9% of our 2007 clients and attendees are of veteran status. We provide one on one counseling to veterans and supply information on the SBA veterans programs to interested parties.

1900 Manufacturing

The White Mountain area has started a strong effort to utilize and market small diameter trees harvested from our local forests. An example is our work with local manufacturers of wood products consists of new sawmill operations in Snowflake and Eagar, and various other small manufacturers of log home, post and poles, and byproducts using woody biomass, such as wood pellets, compost and mulch materials.

2000 Online Activity

The NPC-SBDC maintains an active online presence, through an interactive web site that meets SBA specifications in their Program Announcement, and provides online counseling, training resources and help for startup and expanding small businesses. Through Northland Pioneer College the SBDC offers a series of online classes, which are offered in the college schedule each semester, and is administered and taught by SBDC personnel.
