### Earning an AA Degree with a focus on Literature and Writing classes

NPC does not offer a degree specific to English (this includes Literature and Writing classes). Students interested in English should pursue the Arizona General Education Curriculum (AGEC) requirements for an Associate of Arts degree (AGEC-A) and plan to transfer to another institution to complete a bachelor's degree in English.

*Blocks are suggested for full-time students, but may be adjusted based on course scheduling, student employment, or individual needs.*

To get an AA you need:

- 6 credits of communications
- 3 credits of math; either MAT142 or MAT152, or a higher class that lists one of these as a prerequisite.
- 9 credits of arts and humanities classes
- 8 credits of physical science or biology
- 9 credits of social and behavioral sciences
- 29 credits of electives that are transferable through AZ transfer (see the whole list of electives on page 67 of the course catalog, linked here: <https://www.npc.edu/college-catalog>)

### **Suggested Classes: These classes count as SBS, A&H, or Elective Credits**

You have a lot of choice in the electives you take. The program map above encourages you to take as many ENL2– classes as you can, but you'll still have opportunities to take other classes as electives.

One way to choose electives is based on what interests you about English and Writing classes. Here is a list of different focuses you could choose, with suggested classes you could take as electives. These electives can help you learn more about that focus.

You can also choose from more than one focus. For example, maybe you're interested in the Literature of the Americas and Creative Writing. You could choose some electives from those two focus lists.

Some of these special focus lists have more suggestions than others. For example, there are fewer classes that specifically pertain to Gender and/or Racial Identities, but plenty of other classes will also cover topics related to this category.

**The courses listed here are suggestions, not requirements.** You need a certain number of elective credits to complete an AAS that will transfer, but those credits can come from other classes besides the ones listed here.

Be sure you use the chart above to keep track of how your classes “count” toward your AA degree. If you're not sure, ask an advisor for help!

### **Creative Writing**

These classes can count as either A&H credits or elective credits:
