#### Film and Digital Video Program Map - 2024-25 Catalog

The Film and Digital Video program trains students for a career in motion pictures. This program map outlines recommended and required courses to take for students enrolled full-time at NPC (15 credit hours per semester) over the course of four academic semesters (or two calendar years). Completing the highlighted courses in blue leads to a Certificate of Proficiency (CP) in Film and Digital Video. Completing the highlighted courses in blue in addition to highlighted courses in yellow leads to a Certificate of Applied Science (CAS) in Film and Digital Video. Completing all courses in the program map leads to an Associate of Applied Science (AAS) degree in Film and Digital Video.

For those seeking an Associate of Applied Science (AAS) degree in Film and Digital Video, specific courses from the General Education Courses, Discipline Studies, and Unrestricted Electives requirements are recommended based on four areas of concentration: (1) narrative filmmaking, (2) documentary filmmaking, (3) experimental filmmaking, and (4) industrial filmmaking (for students interested in commercial opportunities in filmmaking).

Not every class is offered every semester.
