THE SCHOLARSHIP ESSAY

Your essay is <u>the key</u> to your scholarship application. It is your chance to show the scholarship review committee that you are worthy of their <u>investment in you</u>, that you are more than your GPA, and that you are a good writer and communicator

- Effective essays do not have to be long.
- An attention-grabbing hook immediately captures the reader's interest.
- Be sure to address all the prompts you are given and stick to the topic.

I. 1st Paragraph

- A. **Start with a <u>story</u>** about what led you to your degree and career path. Make it personal & reveal as much as you can about who you are.
- B. Finish with a statement that leads the reader to the next paragraph: your educational plans.

II. 2nd Paragraph

- A. Now, talk specifically about your educational plans. Include details like:
 - Degree plan
 - Classes taken already
 - What you have left to take
 - When you will graduate
 - Additional degrees you'll pursue
 - Career goals
- B. If you're not sure, explain the possible paths you're exploring.

III. 3rd Paragraph

A. Tell about the <u>resources</u> you already have—how you are helping yourself—and the <u>needs/challenges</u> you still face (your UNMET need).

Include details like:

- Your job—what, where, how many hours
- Financial aid
- Savings
- Family support
- · Other scholarships or tuition waivers
- Size of your family
- Parenting or Caregiving
- Travel/transportation for school
- Health needs
- Housing needs
- Etc.!

IV. 4th Paragraph

- A. <u>Specifically</u> explain how you will use the funds, if awarded. Don't overstate. If the scholarship award is \$1,000 per semester, stick to what \$1,000 will provide.
- B. Tie it all up with a strong conclusion reflecting your core values and personal philosophy.
- C. Conclude with a statement of **thanks**. (Thank you for considering me for this opportunity....)

Extra Tips for a Winning Application:

- **Get references early.** Tell them your deadline & send them your essay so they can write strong letters.
- Show passion! Make the committee feel your excitement and commitment.
- Highlight resilience. Explain how you overcame challenges to show your strength of character.
- Get feedback. Ask someone you trust:
 - What does this essay say about me?
 - How can I improve it?
- Check for errors. Don't rely on spell check.
- **Be honest.** No exaggeration, no Al—your story is unique and worth telling.
- NO AL This is a PERSONAL essay. YOU have a great story that no Al app can compete with!
