This is universally true in education: a teacher's impact on a student ripples outward to the student's family, future coworkers and clients, and the community at large.

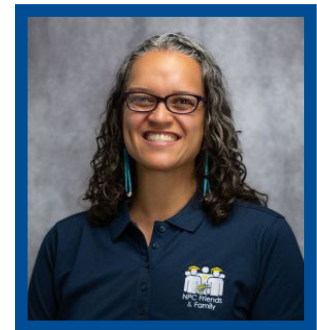
And this is especially true with NPC Friends and Family scholarships. These scholarships are often the vehicle that makes education attainable for NPC students.

The following are excerpts from just a few of the application essays describing students' desires to serve their communities.

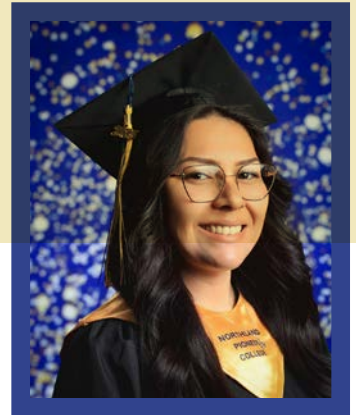

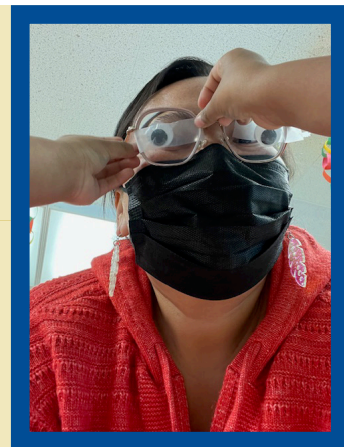

"[In this photo I'm] working with a student with a disability...I was engaging with the student one-on-one, asking, 'Where are the teacher's eyes?' to get an understanding of what the student knows, since the student was very minimal in talking. Using different materials such as googly eyes, cotton balls, tape, and other items, the student proceeded to tape googly eyes on me, demonstrating comprehension. This was the best practicum experience I had and is one of my most talked-about stories. This also helped the educators think of ways to engage with the student and better understand the student's comprehension."
